PLANET's Tom Delaney to speak at STC

Tom Delaney, Planet's government relations director, is scheduled to speak at the CALCP Spring Training Conference on Tuesday, March 5. Tom has been involved in the Pesticide ban proposal that was a huge issue in Durango, CO last August and September.

A citizen group in Durango got enough signatures to force the City Council to hold hearings and to put on the ballot a ban of all fertilizers and pesticides on all city property. (This proposed ban was later withdrawn under the promise from City Council that they would appoint a committee to review the issue and come up with an immediate plan to convert all city parks to an organic management control program. The City has hired a consultant from New England for \$36,000 to come to Durango and prepare a proposal.)

Tom is aware of these issues going on in other states and Canada as well. He will talk about the effects this type of legislation/city resolutions can have on a community and state and how it could effect your day to day operations. As this issue emerges more often around the USA, we as an industry need to be aware of what works and what doesn't in trying to maintain civility and rational thinking and squelch this fear driven threat.

Estimating & Bidding with Ultimate Efficiency

For contractors using manual estimating systems, estimating continues to be expensive, time-consuming, error-prone, and a never-ending source of frustration. In these companies, estimating is based more on experience than anything else. And since only owners or seasoned people have this experience, estimating is unnecessarily expensive and consumes precious time from these valuable people.

The typical manual estimating system today involves driving to the property, walking the property, measuring, taking photos, driving back to the office, deciphering information, and 'number-crunching' to arrive at prices to be entered into a proposal. This process is often loose, informal, and changes for every property.

Even with the introduction of web -based measuring tools, many estimating systems are tedious, inconsistent, and unreliable because they lack a unifying platform to help organize data, make accurate computations, or store estimating information for verification or future use.

Without a defined system, it's often very difficult to retrace the estimator's steps or verify the accuracy of calculations after the proposal is created since the estimator's notes and calculations were not captured in a uniform manner or saved in a logical place.

In many cases, the estimator's notes are discarded or misplaced. Even more problematic, if the prospect wants to negotiate prices, it is extremely difficult to do so without recreating the entire proposal from the ground up.

These manual estimating systems are also very error prone. Using a desktop adding machine with a printed tape was fine in 1961 but that was 50 years ago. Using a cell phone's calculator function with no tape – what is common today – is horribly inefficient and errorprone. Errors are easy to make and difficult to find. One simple undetected error in calculations may be the difference between profit and loss.

The 'number-crunching' aspect of estimating is the most critical but often the most mysterious, due to the complexity of working with multiple variables and many unknowns, resulting in an over-reliance on guesswork and assumptions.

Spreadsheets such as Microsoft Excel, built as productivity tools, are commonly used in businesses throughout the world, and deserve consideration as a solution for the company using out-dated manual processes. By utilizing an estimating program based in Excel, accurate estimates and proposals may be quickly produced, saving precious time that may be used to increase sales capacity and bid more work.

In order to accurately estimate accurately, we need to ensure that our estimating model includes all of the necessary vari-

ables. This is where many of the estimating systems fail to measure up; they are simply incomplete. Because of this, they produce inaccurate estimates.

We also need to understand the types of proposal format options and their associated estimating models. There are many creative ways to develop proposals. Each requires an estimating model and an estimator who knows how to manipulate the system to produce the desired proposal numbers.

By using Microsoft Excel, any type of estimating system may be devised. If you can dream it up, it can be built in Excel. In addition, your estimate may be mapped directly into your proposal without time-consuming, error-prone data entry.


